Origin of Nishikigoi "Swimming Jewels"!

Nishikigoi carp attracts attention as "Swimming Jewels" because one Nishikigoi may cost over 100 million yen. "Nishikigoi-no-Sato" is the only Nishikigoi museum in the world, where visitors can feed the carp. Every year in spring and autumn, the Nishikigoi Fair attracts many Nishikigoi

lovers from overseas to see how Nishikigoi are raised in the clean water of the snow country by traditional methods.





Shoyonshakudama of Katakai fireworks, the largest fireworks in the world!

The Katakai Festival in Ojiya has developed Shoyonshakudama fireworks. The firework explodes into a brilliant spectacle, measuring 800 meters in diameter. The beauty and dynamic sound of the fireworks is spellbinding.

At the Ojiya Bullring, highlights of the bullfights are given in a live commentary for easy understanding. Know the background and each bull's signature move for a more fun, exciting and thrilling experience.



Ojiya-chijimi, a fabric culture passed down in the region

Using a high-quality hemp fabric called Choma, Ojiya-chijimi is woven with a traditional method. It is the first Japanese fabric designated as an Important Intangible Cultural Property by the Japanese government and as an Intangible Cultural Heritage by UNESCO.

Mando used in the Ojiya Festival have moving mechanisms; therefore, they are called Karakuri Mando. Moving mechanisms are designed and created by local residents' associations and others.


During the Edo period (1603-1868), merchants selling Ojiya-chijimi in the metropolitan area often brought home Egami, or Nishikie (picture paper) as souvenirs. There are still many Egami picture papers, which are customarily used for decorations on the Girl's Day.



Go to Yamamotoyama Kogen to see natural landscape!

Rape blossoms in spring, sunflowers in summer, buckwheat in autumn and a sea of clouds in winter. Yamamotoyama Kogen is a scenic spot offering the natural landscape of Ojiya throughout the four seasons.







This is the only Nishikigoi museum in the world. There is a pond in a Japanese garden and another pond in the museum building where visitors can see over 300 carp of approximately 20 varieties swimming gracefully. There is also



an area where visitors can learn about the history and varieties of Nishikigoi carp.

Originated in Ojiya! Beginning of Nishikigoi

Nishikigoi (colored carp) first appeared in the first half of the 19th century during the Edo period (1603-1868). It is said that they first emerged as a result of a sudden mutation in carp that were bred for food at Nijyumurago (a part of present day Ojiya City, Nagaoka City and Uonuma City) in Niigata. Research and improvement followed, new varieties came about, and they soon began to attract attention as ornamental fish from overseas for the number of varieties and high quality. Each Nishikigoi has a different pattern, and it is said no two are alike.

Ojiya-Chijimi

A hemp fabric culture has existed in Ojiya for approximately 1,200 years. Ojiya-chijimi is a traditional fabric that first emerged in the early Edo period (1603-1868) when Masatoshi Horijiro came from Harima Akashi and improved Echigo hemp fabric. Its characteristic creases, called "Shibo," give it a distinctive coolness and texture. Ojiya Tsumugi and Katakai cotton are also popular among Kimono fans.

Ojiya Orimono Kobo (Ojiya fabric workshop)

Located on the first floor, Orinoza is a hands-on fabric gallery where visitors not only learn about the history of textile technology, but they can also try making a coaster using its unique weaving technique. Apparel and interior goods made with Ojiya's traditional fabric can be purchased at Takuminoza on the second floor.

Hegisoba

When you visit Ojiya, you must try Hegisoba buckwheat noodles. Seaweed called *funori* for gluing fabric is used as a binding agent, which makes noodles smooth and firm. Bite-size portions are beautifully arranged on a square, board-like dish called a hegi.

Bull Sumo Wrestling

The sight of two huge bulls weighing more than one ton each crashing into each other as handlers called seko supervise the battle chanting "Yoshita!" is a sight to see. The fact that 400 brave bulls took part in this exciting sacred event for over three days was recorded in a book published 200 years ago. Higashiyama villagers, who raise these special bulls as members of their family, believe it has a history that stretches back 1,000 years. The first tournament of the year is held on May 3rd and one tournament is held every month until November.

Ojiya Bull Sumo Wrestling Arena

A total of 15 to 20 matches per day take place during the tournament. Live commentary is provided to first-time spectators for easy understanding.

Ojiya Festival

Held at the end of August, this grand festival is the largest in Ojiya. It features fireworks, Bon dances by people from every corner of the city and a Karakuri Mando Parade. Mando floats with karakuri mechanisms designed and created by neighborhood and citizen's groups parade through the town accompanied by musical instruments and chanting.


Nikko Shrine Festival

Loved by locals, this traditional event featuring culturally valuable folk arts such as the Honen Shishimai dance and Mikojii-Ningyo-Ayatsuri puppets. It is held in around the middle of July every year.

Katakai Fireworks

The Asahara Shrine Autumn Festival is held on the 9th and 10th of September every year. Fireworks are a symbolic offering to the shrine, and the festival is famous for Yonshakudama, the largest fireworks in the world. For locals, the fireworks are a "pride of the city they demonstrate" in celebrating Coming of Age (for 20-year-olds), Kanreki (for 60-year-olds) and other special events. Around Asahara Shrine, many booths and food stalls offer food and souvenirs. It is truly a wonderful old-style festival.

Yamamotoyama Kogen (Yamamotoyama Highland)

Located 336 meters above sea level, the observatory at Yamamotoyama Kogen offers a view of the three mountains of Echigo, the Aizu mountain range, and the Shinano River. Autumn attracts many birdwatchers

because this is considered one of the best birdwatching spots in the eastern Japan to watch migrating bird of prey such as eagles and hawks.

Ojāru, Citizen's House

Ojiya Shinanogawa Hydroelectric Power Station

This is a place of residents and visitors to relax and to learn about hydropower generation and the Shinanogawa River. It also offers lodging. Simulators allow visitors to experience how it feels to be a driver, which is fun for children. A campground and barbeque pits are available for outdoor pleasure. People can play with snow during the winter season. Many couples visit to ring the "Koryu-no-kane (Bell of Exchange)," the symbol of the facility.

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Yudokoro Chijimi-no-Sato (day-use hot spring)

Onsen spa having no lodging facilities annexed to a roadside station. There are two types of baths: a Japanese-style Tsumugi-no-yu and a western-style Chijimi-no-yu. One week, the Japanese-style bath is reserved for men, and the western-style is reserved for women; the next week, women use the Japanese-style bath, and men use the other. The restaurant serves Hegisoba buckwheat noodles and chewy udon noodles, as well as bountiful set meals. Ojiya souvenirs are sold at the shop.




